INFANCY TO ADULTHOOD OF IIFM: A JOURNEY WELL LIVED

It was one of the usual hot summer evenings of Bhopal on 27th May 1984 when my tryst with Indian Institute of Forest Management (IIFM) began. A surprise awaited for me as I saw IIFM was housed in an apartment, E-5/120 in Area Colony. Unlike the luxuries of modern days guest house with good amenities, my first night was spent on the verandah of the apartment on a bedding. The reality was very different than what I had imagined while leaving from Hyderabad for Bhopal. I had left Hyderabad imagining a big campus and guest house and I found the institute functioning from an apartment. This was my maiden visit to Bhopal as my interview for faculty position was organized at Indian Institute of Management Ahmadabad

(IIMA). At that time, on the request of the Govt. of India, IIMA was incubating and developing IIFM as the first management institute in the Forestry sector

On 28th May 1984, I joined as Assistant Professor, and another pleasant surprise awaited me, the then Director J K Chaturvedi mentioned "Welcome, you are the first faculty member of IIFM!". He himself had joined as Director in February 1984 with only a handful of staff. The first task assigned to me was to read 'Ten-Year Perspective Plan of IIFM' prepared by IIMA, to acquaint myself with the vision and mandate of IIFM. Reading of the Perspective Plan helped me overcome my initial disappointment of spending a night on verandah as the document envisioned great future of IIFM at par with the IIMs.

By August 1984 three more faculty members joined the institute. Interestingly, none of the four faculty members had any exposure to forestry sector except the Director who was an Indian Forest Service (IFS) officer and had joined IIFM on deputation. Our first mandate was to organize Management Development Programme (MDP). In October 1984, I took my first session in MDP. As a 27 year old faculty, I had to impart knowledge to a class of all 40+ years old senior Forest Officers as students. I could do so because I spoke on Social Dimensions of Forestry, which was a new dimension for them, a departure from regulatory and protection functions of forestry. I applied Jack Westby's concept 'Forestry is about People, not Trees alone' (In his seminal book "Purpose of the Forest"). My approach was 'Putting People First' as narrated by my good friend Michael M Cernea, World Bank Sociologist.

By 1988, when we launched our flagship programme Post Graduate Diploma in Forestry Management (PGDFM), the faculty strength became 14. During the intervening period we were oriented and sensitized towards forestry sector by making tours to several forest areas, National Parks, visit to Forest Resource Institute (FRI), Dehradun and State Forest Resource Institute (SFRI), Jabalpur. We were introduced to case writing and case teaching methodology by the professors from the Harvard University and IIM Ahmadabad. In 1987, we organized a big International Conference on Forestry Education at Delhi where forestry officials and academicians from eight countries participated and provided inputs to develop curriculum for the courses in IIFM. In initial years, SIDA (Swedish International Development Authority), actively partnered with IIFM and created an endowment for scholarships for all students who joined.

Starting a forestry management course at Masters level was a herculean task before us as there was no such precedence available in the country. At that time the courses were available for either management or forestry or Social Sciences. Nevertheless, we blended all these three streams in our curriculum and developed courses that were unique and novel. The impact of such rich curriculum is now being reflected through the diverse portfolios which our Alumni hold globally. This approach built resilience among the students to face any eventuality in their professional career.

In July,1988, we started PGDFM course with a planned intake of 30 students but finally 27 students took admission with diverse background. 25% of the total students were female students. 'Small is Beautiful'-as the saying goes, we had wonderful students and faculty interactions.. The pedagogy we used was very innovative and interactive. During winter mornings, I remember taking classes in the open area of library lawn with cozy sun light. In one of the open classes we screened Hindi movie "Manthan" (directed by the famous Shyam Benegal), to understand rural society in India. The movie was shown through a 16 mm projector, in the library lawn in the evening. Library lawn used to be the venue for lots of activities, and I believe the legacy continues even today. Those days, reading materials used to be cyclostyled² and circulated, Overhead Projector (OHP) sheets were used for presentations. The technologies those days were-a far cry from the present digital age.

Days at IIFM were full of learning for the students as well as for the faculties. Faculties and students used to participate in different co-curricular activities including sports and cultural events. IIFM provided equal opportunities to the family members of faculties and staff to participate in different events. Learning for the students were not limited to classroom teaching only but it was interwoven with fun and frolic as well. As there was no indoor Badminton Court in initial days, Room No.118 was converted into an indoor Badminton court till the actual indoor court was built with other sports facilities. We always had healthy competition among faculties, students and staff in the sports viz. Cricket, Badminton, Table Tennis etc. Sports were inherent in the institute culture from the beginning even when the infrastructural facilities were limited earlier.

Learning for the students at IIFM was predominantly field based. Out of the total 21 months of PGDFM program, seven and half months were spent in field. The field components comprised of Field work, Organizational Training-I (OT-I during summer) and Organizational Training-II (OT-II in the second year of the course). Each component of the field comprised of 10 weeks. Field components provided good exposure and opportunity for the students to visit villages and stay in rural area. While the rural areas were lacking the basic amenities sometimes viz. electricity, proper washroom etc. but living in rural ambience was definitely learning for the students. The richness of field components helped the student to develop a comprehensive perspective. Faculties' engagement in the Field Work components was a Sine qua non. Initially, we had to struggle to find appropriate projects for the students for OT and also for the field work attachment with the Forest Department, Revenue Department, Forest based industries, and NGOs. The faculties used to continuously travel for 15-20 days (leaving the family in Bhopal) to arrange projects for the students.

Placement for the first batch was big a challenge for us with no history of management education in Forestry, moreover IIFM was an unknown entity at that point of time. However, we organized conferences with prospective employers where our students made wonderful presentations. It appealed to the prospective employers and with tough negotiations, we achieved 100% placement for the first batch of PGDFM students. This set the tone for subsequent placements over the years.

Since then, lot of water has flown into lakes of Bhopal. The city, which was already beautiful, developed further bypassing the turmoil of one of the worst industrial disasters in 1984, the Bhopal gas tragedy. Over a period of time, IIFM moved from one apartment to two, then to three and then finally to a 200-acre campus, which is still counted as one of the most beautiful campus in India. I have literally seen it grow from its days of infancy and then attaining adulthood in the three decades that I have spent there. I must say, it has been an exciting journey. My prime youth time was devoted to IIFM; my children grew there along with several batches of students. My farewell at IIFM was on 4th August 2013, a program was organized by the students and it was also participated by the first batch student Anandi. In the farewell program my wife Madhuree mentioned that IIFM is in my blood and due to my passion for the institute I spent good long time with students and faculty colleagues in academic as well as in co-curricular activities.

I can go on unfolding several anecdotes...... I intend to write a book later on Institution Building, especially focusing on IIFM. I have received several requests from the alumni as well to narrate the memories of IIFM in the form of a book. I am very grateful to all my students who provided wonderful opportunity to me, to be part of this unforgettable journey at IIFM. In addition to them, my family members and colleagues (both faculty & staff) have a great role in my spending unforgettable decades at the institute

PARTICIPATION IN ALL INDIA FOREST SPORTS MEET: A DREAM FULFILLED



Even before joining IIFM, I was familiar with All India Forest Sports Meet as my father was a forest officer from Jharkhand. I grew watching him participate in table tennis matches in the Forest Sports Meet. I have fond memories of his practice sessions in which I also used to assist him. I always dreamt of wearing his jerseys written "Jharkhand" on the back and participate in the meet. Those jerseys used to be prized possession for me.

Time flies and in 2013 I joined IIFM to pursue PGDFM course. I was very excited to learn that joining IIFM will also fulfill my dream to participate in All India Forest Sports Meet and that too for two successive years. Unfortunately the event got cancelled in 2013 but I could get the opportunity to participate in 2014 at a wonderful venue Goa. By this time my father was retired from the forest services.

Wearing the jersey of IIFM, I was excited to get a glimpse of what my father witnessed for years. During the opening ceremony our team from IIFM was standing next to the Jharkhand team. I could see many familiar faces with whom I used to play during their practice sessions with my father. I had spent good time with them at Ranchi. They were equally happy to see me and could relate with my passion to participate in the meet. I opted to particiapte in table tennis for singles, doubles and mixed doubles matches.

As the match schedule was announced and the games started I eagerly and anxiously waited for my schedule. My father could not get any medal during his participation in the Forest Sports Meet and probably due to the expectation to get a medal and my first opportunity to participate in a big event, I was feeling a bit nervous. I started with men's single table tennis match. I could not go beyond second round. I was disheartened but did not lose hope. My next opportunity was to participate in the men's double and mixed double matches. The match was against Bihar Team. Just before the men's double match started, a player from the opponent team

came and asked "are you Mahto ji's son? Yes, I replied". He was pleased to know and mentioned that he had played with my father in the Sports Meet. We won this match and gradually I started feeling familiar to the ambience of the Sports Meet. It was good to meet many people from different states. In the men's double match, we lost after progressing to few rounds but the overall experience was very good.

The last event for me was mixed doubles match. This time our match was scheduled with Jharkhand team and I could see familiar faces in the opponent team. I had assisted one of the team members during his practice sessions at Ranchi while the lady member of the opponent team had played earlier with my father in the mixed doubles. It was an exciting match and I had mustered enough confidence by this time to win this match. Our team moved ahead in next rounds and we could reach to the semi-finals. Our opponent team in the semi-finals was too good for us but we put our best in the match but the opponents were superior in terms of experience and skills and we lost the match. At last we had the opportunity to fight for the bronze medal. We had a good match and the audeince were thrilled to watch the contest. I was cheered by the crowd for my speedy and flat smashes. Well, we lost this match even after a tough fight. With this, my dream of getting a medal also ended, nonetheless I was very happy to participate in such a big event and perform. Later, we came to know that we missed the medal by a whisker but we were rewarded with one point and we stood at fourth position. The additional point helped improve our overall team ranking. This definitely was some achievement for me as well as for my father. The smile on his face when I told him about it was my biggest prize and the day still remains one of my fondest memories.

A NOTE FOR THE STUDENTS: TIPS TO MAKE YOUR FUTURE BRIGHT

I last visited IIFM campus in November 2019 after a gap of more than a decade. It was a nostalgic moment walking down the memory lane... those Bamboosa parties and our Mahua bar (does not exist officially). While a lot has changed on the campus in terms of infrastructure, the traditions and rituals have survived. The late evening ritualistic "Gyaan session with alumni" I had with the students made me realize that I too once stood on the other side, not so sure about my future, post IIFM.

I started my career in 2002 with Rural Development Department, Govt of MP, implementing development schemes on ground. Next opportunity I got was to work on institutional development of grassroots NGOs with ARAVALI in Rajasthan. Subsequently I jumped into microfinance with CARE India and then to ICICI Bank for Rural & Agri Banking and later Mortgage Finance. In 2011 I joined HDFC Bank into a Brand & Communication role where I have worked on developing Artificial Intelligence (AI) based solutions, dabbling with big data, Behavioral Economics led Marketing to User Interface (UI). All my job opportunities were not just in a different subject area but also a different sector too. In each job I first slogged, failed but bounced back to learn and grow. Today having crossed the ocean, I realize how IIFM had subtly laid the foundation for this journey.

Let me explain my point of view from a few hard truths of life.

- 1. Jobs that existed in 2002 (the year I passed out of IIFM) don't exist today and vice versa: The subject matter I studied at IIFM didn't help much. It was the exposure through extensive field trips across India, learning to adjust in hostel life with a small yet diversified batch helped develop the right attitude in life. An open mind with acceptance to change, inquisitiveness to learn new things in life and adapt.
- 2. Ability to 'Learn, Unlearn and Relearn' is a skill to be acquired: Being a bio-science graduate, making an effort to study and appreciate new subjects from Accounts/Economics to Marketing to GIS was daunting. I didn't realize it then that it took the fear of a new subject/unknown, out of me.
- 3. Underdogs stand a better chance to win the race: The reason is that they do not come with any baggage and give a good fight for survival, hence higher adaptability and agility. Each organization I worked for, hired me for my attitude because they believed that I can quickly learn new skills and deliver.
- 4. Its high EQ and not IQ that gives you success in life: Ever wondered why the backbenchers often turn out to be more successful in life? Probably because they are able to see the big picture from a distance and are better at understanding and managing people. In your professional world, the success of your project depends upon how well are you able to handle your stakeholders (top bosses to juniors to clients / community) to deliver the outcomes.

Last but not the least......add **RESILIENCE** to your DNA because it's the failures in life that will reveal your path to success.





After an average performance in CAT, I knew for sure that my dream to pursue MBA from an IIM was over. For almost a year I had slogged day and night for IIM. However, fate had other plans for me. So without wasting even a minute in grief, I moved on and tried to find some other top-tier colleges. My search stopped at IIFM. Now when I am on the verge of completing my stay at this unique institute I feel happy for the rich experience I got here.

Life at IIFM is amazing. A post-graduate course has its share of exams, quizzes, and mid-terms and though it seems a bit hectic at times, soon one learns to cope up with. After months of sharing a room, running to "Sanchi Parlour" now and then, adjusting to sleepless nights, washing clothes at 3 in the morning and attending classes at 9, all one could say is that hostel life is the best thing that has happened to me.

The campus is fascinating and never stops surprising us with amazing sunsets. Camping in grassland on Fridays and waking up to the calls of Peacocks, venturing into the wild, unexplored caves of the campus, having bonfires and toasting friendship and Marshmallows together and climbing on top of" India Gateour gateway to the wilderness", are the things to cherish forever.

The institute focuses on the all-round development of its students and therefore teachings are not only confined to the classrooms. The open learning (O.L.D.) sessions conducted every other month have a significant impact on students. It is rightly said that at IIFM students graduate but they never leave. One realizes this fact when one sees alums coming over and over again and the respect that they hold for their alma mater.

In a nutshell, IIFM as an institute will open your eyes to a world full of hopes. You will meet a number of people and see different shades of life. You will fall in love with solitude and yet embrace company. IIFM makes me feel happier and crazier. Every part of me knows that I have changed. I have certainly found my voice and dream.
