ADULT LEARNING

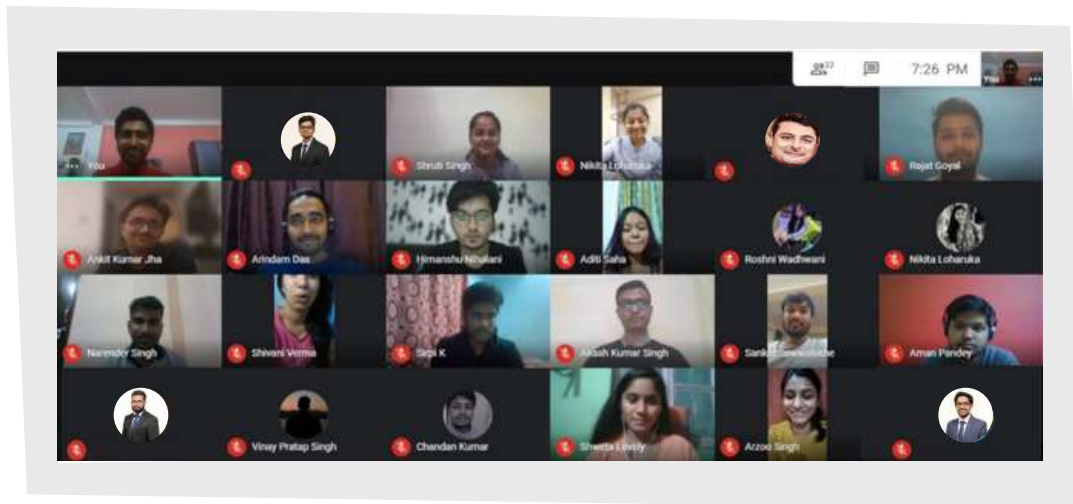
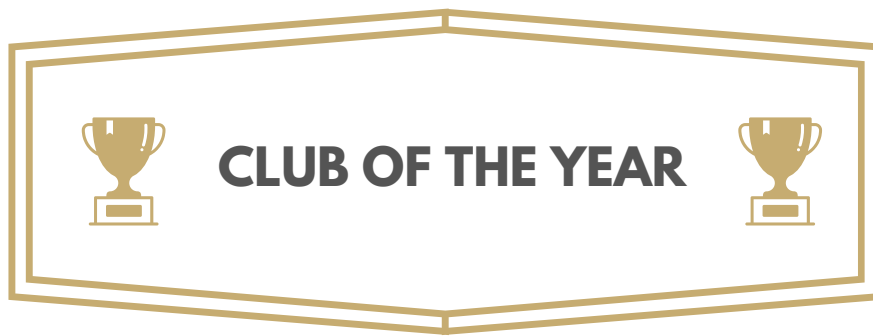

The above log of events clearly justifies the award that has been conferred on ANC. ANC kept up its motto of- “Network is our net worth” even in the trying and testing times.

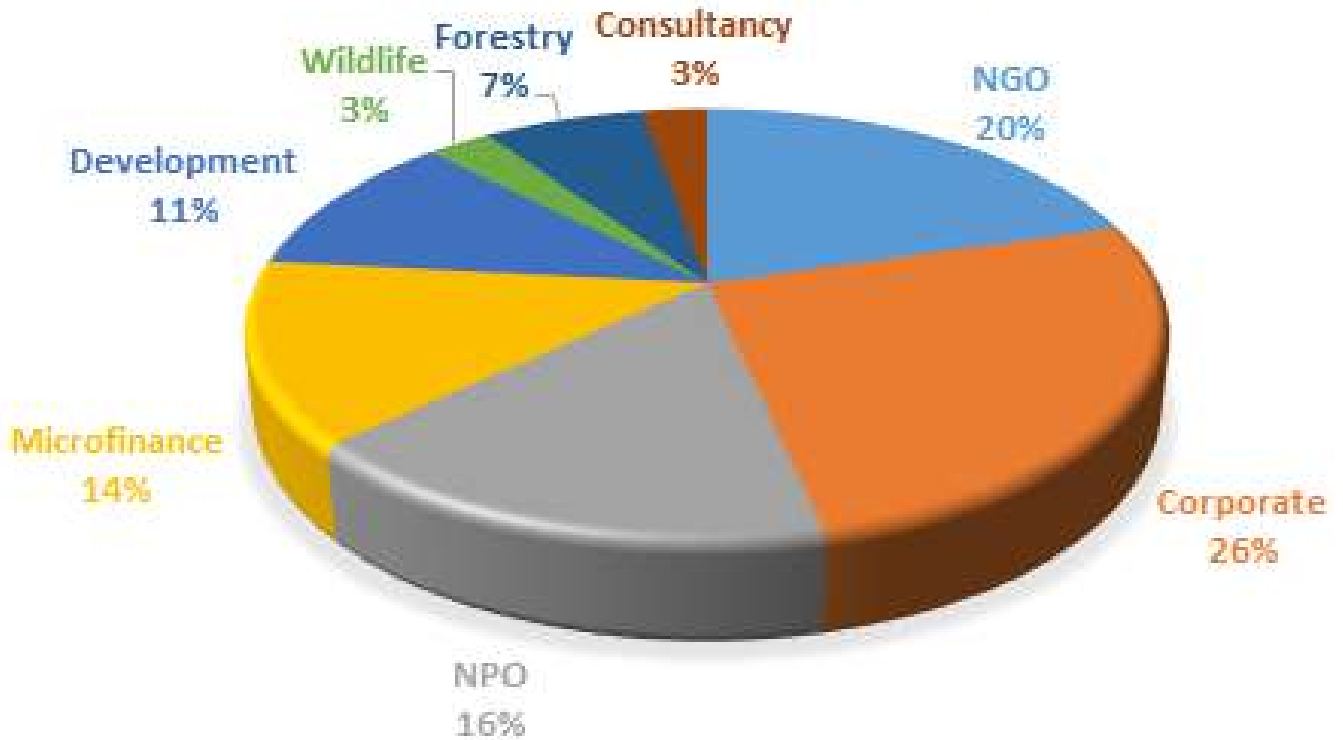

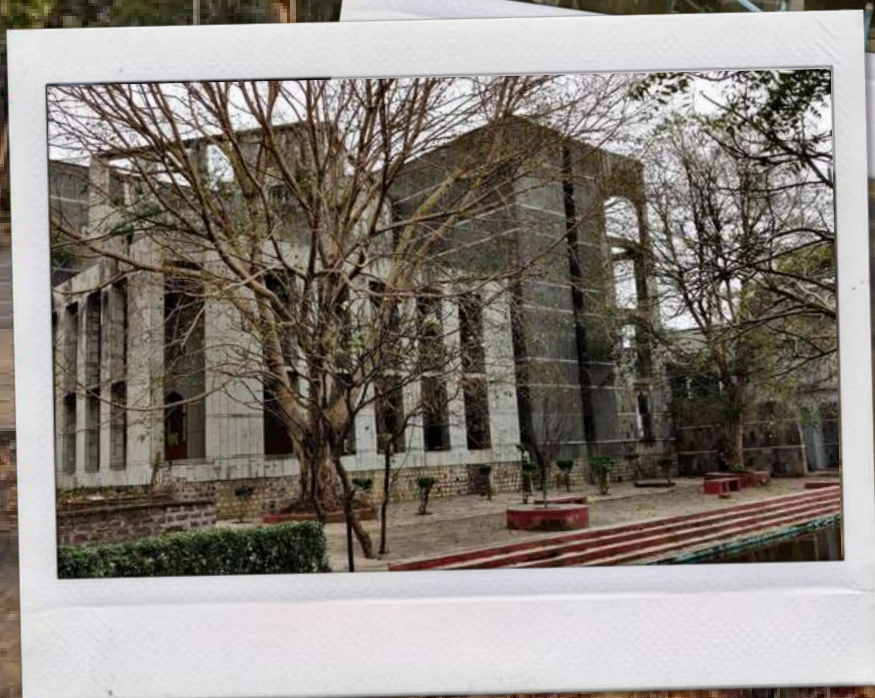
